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From Rev. Barbara Evans-Routley

As I have been driving around recently, I have seen an awful lot of St George's Cross flags up on street lamps. Apart from marvelling at the commitment of climbing ladders that high to

put them up, I have wondered what they say about who we are as a community, to feel the need to put flags up in this way. I've heard some people talking about wanting to be proud of their country and community. That seems a very fair statement. But I'm not entirely sure that we weren't proud in the first place.



For others their sense of identity is tied to the flag of their nation. We see this particularly when we are part of sporting events. For some nations it is part of their national identity to have their flag displayed in all sorts of ways. For British people that has often been linked with our sense of humour, who can forget the Spice Girls of the 90's or the people in Union Flag suits on days celebrating Royal events.

This time though, to me it has felt different. As much as I am proud to be British, there has felt to be an undertone to this celebration of our flag; an undertone that hasn't felt very British. Historically as a nation, we have been a mix of many nations, partly because we have experienced invasion by the Vikings and the Normans, partly because we at one time had an empire and

are now part of a Commonwealth. The use of the St George's flag though has felt exclusive and excluding. Not least, we are part of a united kingdom which has in itself diversity at its heart. And we can't forget of course that St George was a man from Cappadocia (modern day Türkiye) who never came to Britain. Given this huge cultural mix, where do we find our identity?

Inevitably, as Christians, we find it in the cross. Not St George's, but Christ's. At the heart of St George's flag is that cross, a cross that speaks of unconditional love and sacrifice. The cross that we are marked with at our baptism marks us indelibly for life, with a sign that someone loved us so much, that they were willing to give up their life so that we could have life in all its fullness. That unconditional love isn't about where we are born, but who we belong to. Every denomination's baptism service speaks of Christ's love for us. The Methodists put it like this:

"For you, Jesus Christ came into the world. For you he lived and showed God's love. For you he suffered death on the cross. For you he triumphed over death rising to newness of life. For you he lives and prays at God's right hand. All this for you before you could know anything of it. In your baptism the words of scripture are fulfilled, "we love because God first loved us"."

This is what it is all about, we love because God loves us. It is wrong then to use the cross to exclude and not to share God's love. Christ died for us, before we could know anything of it. This is prevenient grace – literally pre-existing grace, which was given for us before we were born. It wasn't earnt, it wasn't applied to a particular nation or people, or to someone who could earn it or be worthy of it, but to everyone. This is our faith, that God loves us all, regardless of who we are. And, if God offers us this grace, then we are expected to offer it to others, to love others, because we have been loved by God first. Not everyone welcomes this idea, but St George's cross should be a reminder that all are welcome, because we are welcome, and no one person is excluded from God's love.

EDUCATION SUNDAY



For well over one hundred years, there has been an annual recognition of Education Sunday in England and Wales. It is a national day of prayer and celebration for everyone in the world of education.

The theme is devised by an ecumenical steering group representing different Christian denominations and organisations.

Since 2016, it has been celebrated on the second Sunday in September, coinciding with the start of the school year (prior to this it was celebrated on the ninth Sunday before Easter). The resources are intended to be used as a springboard for a variety of events on or around Education Sunday.

This year Education Sunday fell on 14 September and "Lost and Found" was the theme. However, we will be having a "Second Sunday "service on this theme on October 12

We will be looking at the well-known parables from Luke's Gospel, the parable of the lost sheep and the parable of the lost coin (Luke 15.1-10).

In our schools, colleges and universities, there are many young people who feel lost, or appear to be lost. This can be because the institutions are so big that they don't feel noticed, because don't feel they fit with the expectations of the institution or their peers or because of the unseen struggles at home. Others appear to us to be lost because of the way they behave or fail to engage.

Our churches are wonderful resources in local communities, and this year we encourage you to think about how our church can build relationships with local schools, colleges or universities.

FROM THE SECRETARIES

September's Church Council meeting, held on Wednesday 24th, took the form of a discussion between Barbara, our new minister, and members of Church Council on the **current mission and work programme of Christ Church and our priorities for the coming year.** This was a good chance to get to know one another and thinking for the future direction of the church here in Lewes

After endorsement at the Congregational Meeting in early August, we submitted an application for grant from the URC Southern Synod's Strategic Mission Fund (SMF). This application is to enable us to make long-term appointments (up to five years) for a Lay Worker (to replace Claire after she retires) and an Administrative Support worker. Both posts are part-time. Our application went to the SMF Panel meeting on September 17 and we are very pleased to report that it was successful and that we can now commence the recruitment process for two part-time posts. The Synod grant aid will provide £15,000 a year for five years, allowing us to finance these posts through to early 2031.

We will need to appoint a **Recruitment Panel** to oversee the process of:

- preparing information packs for interested persons
- placing advertisements on social media
- responding to queries from potential applicants
- assessing applications and shortlisting
- interviewing shortlisted candidates
- follow up with preferred candidates and feedback to others

Church Council considered this matter at its meeting on September 24, and has appointed Barbara, Claire, Neil and Lindsay to serve on the Panel

We held a successful **Community BBQ** at Christ Church on **Wednesday 30 July, organised with our friends from the Lewes Community Food Partnership (LCFP).** The event was attended by around 50 people on a warm day. The clouds threatened rain, but fortunately it stayed dry. This enabled us to make full use of the garden, with chairs and tables outside, close to our

BBQ kitchen pictured below. Our BBQ chefs looked the part, with the aprons and hats.





Inside, we had some children's activities organised by Ian and Judy Christie-Miller. These were very much appreciated by the children, particularly those having great fun making animal face masks. Thank you to Ian and Judy, and to all our other volunteers who helped on the day.

We have another community event in partnership with LCFP at a **Harvest Celebration** during the autumn half-term on the afternoon of **Wednesday October 29.** More details to follow.



Congratulations to **Vivian** on her school exam success this summer. She is now starting a course in hospitality management in Nairobi, Kenya. The course will include work placements in both Kenya and further afield. We wish her well on her new course, which we hope will set her up for a rewarding career.

CHRIST CHURCH WALKS



A summer day on the Anchor Bridge at Barcombe

Our **August walk** on Sunday 17th enjoyed beautiful summer weather. This attracted 11 of us + 1 dog for a walk in the Ouse Valley. We started from **Isfield** and set off down through the fields to the river. We picked up the Sussex Ouse Way (which follows the river from source to sea), close to a memorial sign to James Smith (alias "Jim the Fish"), the bailiff of the river in these parts for more than 50 years, till his passing in 2021.

We followed the river down to the bridge at the Anchor Inn, a visitor "hot spot" due to its pub, large garden and boats/paddleboards for hire. The picture above shows our group at the Anchor Bridge. We stopped at the ice cream kiosk there for welcome refreshments in the warm summer sun. We then cut away from the river, before heading north across the river floodplain and then back to Isfield. The hedgerows were laden with blackberries: the hot and dry summer has produced a marvellous crop of soft fruit this year.

The **September walk** on Sunday 20th was at **Streat.** It was cool but dry day.

The walk started near the village church and, next door, the magnificent early 17th century mansion of Streat Place. It then followed the greensand ridge east towards Plumpton, with the ridge's modest elevation affording wonderful views south



towards the Downs, the Streat "V" (trees planted on the north-facing escarpment of the Downs to commemorate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887) and Plumpton Cross (which commemorates the Battle of Lewes in 1264). The route then turned north, skirting Plumpton Racecourse. By chance, there was a race meeting on at Plumpton and we saw horses and jockeys heading up to the top of the course and the start of their race. The walkers then had to negotiate a string of stiles as they crossed the fields back up to Streat.



The October walk is on Sunday 19. Meet at the church at 1.30 p.m for car sharing. The planned route starts from Telscombe village (near the church) and we will walk down, and then back up, Telscombe Tye, an area of common land with great views out to sea. It is about 3 miles / 5 km long.

The November walk is on Sunday 16. Meet at the church at 1.00 p.m. (the afternoons are getting shorter by then) for car sharing and then begin the walk at the Lower Lodges Car Park in Stanmer Park. Our walk will go north into the Downs, overlooking the University of Sussex campus, before returning via Stanmer village, for a tea stop. Again, this is a distance of around 3 miles /5 km.

The very full calendar in December means that we will not arrange a walk that month, but will resume with our traditional New Years' Day walk to Mount Caburn on the morning of Thursday January 1.

LEWES BEREAVEMENT CIRCLE

The Lewes Bereavement Circle (LBC) are still meeting on the first Wednesday of each month at 1.50pm – 3pm, at the Lewes House of Friendship (LHOF) on School Hill, Lewes

Holiday times can be particularly difficult for people following the death of a friend or loved one, and we are here to offer a warm welcome in a safe space, for bereaved people to come and share your memories, challenges and meet other people who are walking a similar path to yourself.

LBC is a free self-support group, based at the LHOF, with three facilitators, one of which is a practising councillor, who run the circle.

Anyone is welcome to come and join us and through peer support our aim is that their grief journey is made a little easier. There is no commitment to come each month, and attendees can stay for a short or long time, depending on how they feel on that particular day.

We have been running for well over a year now and thought we would like to try and reach even more people going through bereavement, this time in a slightly more informal way, and with so many bereavement stages and circumstances leading to being bereaved it's never going to be appropriate for everyone, and this is something that we are very aware of.

There is no judgement, grief hierarchy, racist, homophobic or inappropriate behaviour, tolerated within the circle

Please bear in mind each month will have a different vibe to it, as the people attending with vary from month to month.

Everyone who has attended any or our previous meeting is more than welcome to come back, to reconnect with us and others going through their bereavement journey.

We look forward to meeting anyone that you feel might benefit from joining us and hope that you will pass on our details to any of your clients, parishioners, friends, patients and family members.
