I'm sure many of us are beginning this season of Advent preparing. Most of us will be thinking about the practicalities of the season – guests, food, gifts, decorations and events. But in a theological sense we are also preparing. Advent marks the

period of Mary's pregnancy. For those who have had children or know someone who has, you will be aware of the preparation that goes into waiting for the big day. Somehow, one tiny arrival can cause enormous amounts of upheaval. And likewise, for us advent can be a fairly frantic time preparing for the "big day". Who gets what, who visits whom, what we hope for, where we will be. Cleaning the house, finding a spare space for the extra guest to sleep in or the extra chair for them to be seated at. And if the magazines and tv adverts are to be believed, the secret to surviving it all is the preparation.

Alongside this preparation is also the waiting. Babies come in their own time. But in a world full of instant gratification, social media and 24-hour news coverage, waiting is something that is becoming increasingly alien to us. We struggle with waiting and rarely experience it in a positive light. The need to wait is a challenge when we have become unaccustomed to doing so.

Putting these two, preparation and waiting, together, leads to us being invited into a particular place. Yes, we can just focus on the practical elements of waiting for Christmas, but we can use the time to look inward too. The preparation of our hearts and minds is a task in itself. What is the purpose of Christ, if it is not to change us — and I don't mean because we will feel a little poorer and possibly be a bit gift richer. We are invited to experience love. The love of a vulnerable baby, born into an unforgiving world, born to love and be loved. For to experience in ourselves the unconditional love of the God who created us and wishes to hold us in eternal love.

What would it mean to you to really know, deep in your heart, that you are loved? And what would it change?

Let this time of Advent be a time to prepare yourself so that you can know in your heart that this is true. I wish you a very happy Christmas.

FROM THE SECRETARIES

Welcome to the December 2025 and January 2026 edition of *CC Link*. We wish a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to all our readers.

Advent Sunday marks the start of another church year and, of course, the calendar year will turn around to 2026 at the end of December. It has been a good year



for Christ Church. After several years without a minister, we were very pleased indeed to welcome Rev. Barbara Evans - Routley to Christ Church in September. Barbara is still settling into her new role — alongside her many other duties with CSUA and four other churches - but is already making her mark, as she gets to know Christ Church, its congregation and the local Lewes community.

With Claire Bell standing down as our lay worker in spring 2026, we were encouraged to bid for funding from the URC Southern Synod's Strategic Mission Fund to carry forward our lay work in the local community, and also to strengthen our administrative capacity in an increasingly complex world.

Our bid was successful, and we have secured funding which should take us up to early 2031. The challenge for us is now to use this enhanced ministerial and lay capacity to grow our church and develop a stronger role in the local community.

We have made good progress with **recruitment of new Lay Worker**. After advertising in October., and interviews in November, we have made a conditional offer to **Hannah Clark**, which she has accepted. We hope that this will enable Hannah to start work with us early in the New Year, once all the paperwork has been completed. She will work alongside Claire for three months to settle into the job.

We feel very fortunate to have recruited Hannah. She currently works as Communications Officer with IBEX South Coast, a Christian charity helping churches find ways to use their resources and spaces to support communities across Hampshire and Dorset. She formerly worked in the URC's central communications team at Church House London. Hannah also has teaching experience, and led work on setting up Crossway Tots in Seaford. She lives in Seaford with her young family.

Our **Bible Study** classes have continued with "Christian Belief in the 21st century", taking as our starting point the Nicene Creed, which was written in AD 325 and so celebrated its 1700th anniversary this year. Thanks to David Smith and Claire Bell, who have worked on a draft booklet, which has been central to our discussions. The booklet will be further refined in the light of our discussions and, hopefully, finalised in 2026.

In January, our Bible Study classes will pick up the last of the A Rocha New Zealand /Aotearoa "Rich Living" series on "Waste", the last in the series. After that, we will have a series of Lent classes, possibly in partnership with another Lewes church.

Thank you to Claire, and our friends at the Fitzjohn's Food Partnership for organising the **Community Harvest Festival** on Wednesday October 29. More than 60 people



attended, including some Tots families. It was a very wet day in the middle of half term. Curiously, this helped us attract a good turn-out, as we were providing an afternoon out for the family away from the rain.

There was a wide range of food, crafts (making bird feeders), face painting, a dressing up box, apple press, making flavoured apple jellies (thanks to Cllr Imogen Makepeace) and "guess the weight of the pumpkin". The event was popular with the many local families who are having difficulty making ends meet, or who may not get out much to meet other people.

We have applied to Lewes Town Council's Exhibition Fund/ Blunt's Charity for funding, which will enable us to organise three more similar events in 2026. Sunday December 28: Normal Sunday service at 10:30


Thursday January 1: New Year's Day walk starting at Cliffe Corner,



FINANCIAL NEWS

Here are some bits of financial information to bring you up to date:

- The **CSUA** assessment for 25/26 (Sept to Aug) has increased by 3% and will be £6625 for Christ Church.
- The **URC Ministry & Mission Fund** contribution (which goes from Jan to Dec so this changes next January) is a 1% decrease for Christ Church and will be £3288 for the year.
- Our **special charity appeals** in September raised £218.31 for the Christian Aid (CA) Afghan Earthquake Appeal and £132.71 for the CA Harvest Appeal from last month.
- Christ Church Tots raised £115.11 for the **BBC Children in Need Appeal** on November 15

My Chaplaincy work continues to keep me very busy at the hospital each week. I thought you might like to hear of a testimony from a young man I recently ministered too. He had severe burns on his chest and face, which he received whilst walking to his place of work. Some youths set upon him dousing him with petrol and setting him alight. When I asked him about his faith, he told me his faith in God has risen because his life was spared. The young man inspired me with his strength and his insightfulness, letting go of hatred and bitterness towards his attackers.

My studies for a certificate in Contemporary Chaplaincy is going well. It's broadening my mind and how I approach my work. It's online and self paced which requires me to be very disciplined and organised.

The pictures are of the Thika Chaplaincy Team I serve with. We prayed together and thanked the hospital for their warm reception to us throughout 2025. We presented gifts in the Chapel to Chaplain Catherine representing the hospital chaplaincy department.

As Chaplains we currently preparing for 'Christmas Comfort' at Nairobi Remand Prison which houses approximately 4,200 men. This is taking place on Wednesday 10 December. We will spend the morning in fellowship with the prisoners and officers, taking gifts such as soap, toothpaste, shower shoes, bibles etc.

The team has asked me to wish you all at Christ Church a very blessed festive season.



"THE CONNEXION" TO END.....

...... AND A CHALLENGING ART EXHIBITION AT DITCHLING

Trigger warning: This article contains references to sexual abuse which some readers may find distressing or triggering

The Methodist Church's quarterly magazine "The Connexion" is to cease publication after its Winter2025 edition (just out).

The magazine celebrates the church's work in many different places around the UK and how its long held ethos of a wide ranging connexion between church members is being played out in the fast changing modern world. It often asks us "What does it mean to be a Methodist in the early 21st century? " Since it commenced in 2015, we have stocked copies at the back of the church for everyone to read.

Like many other forms of the printed word, it has been overtaken by the digital world and the many different forms of communication it offers.

"The Connexion" has never been shy of confronting the difficult issues that face the church and wider British society. **The latest (and final) edition looks at** whether it is possible to separate art from the artist that created it.

It focuses on the work of the artist Eric Gill, a famous sculptor, typographer and printmaker. Gill and his work were celebrated in his life (1882-1940), but after his death he was revealed to be a prolific sexual abuser, including towards his own daughters. Much of his artistic work was done when Gill was living in Ditchling, East Sussex

One of Gill's most famous works was "The Annunciation", which was acquired by the Methodist Modern Art Collection (MMAC) before his crimes were revealed. Now that the crimes are widely known, should the art work be kept out of public view? After consulting survivors of sexual abuse, the MMAC decided that the best course of action was to display the artwork and to accompany it with the testimony of those who have suffered abuse. The survivors wanted to use the artwork to "start conversations, acknowledge the victims, confront historical abuse, and discuss the intersections with faith "

With this in mind, MMAC approached **Ditchling Museum of Art and Craft** to see if they would co-curate an exhibition. Working with survivors, a new exhibition called **"It Takes a Village"** includes a section which explores the lives of Gill's daughters, with the survivors selecting works and telling their stories, including the daughters' own pictures from childhood and some of Gill's portraits of them.

"It Takes a Village" looks at Ditchling's wider artistic legacy, and a separate section looks at Gill and the survivors of his abuse, in case any visitors who have suffered abuse find it distressing or triggering
